1. Europa im Gespräch – Control & Return; the European banopticon approach of refugees

Prof. Dr. Marie-Laure Basilien-Gainche (Universität Jean Moulin Lyon 3), University of Fribourg, Miséricorde, Room Jäggi (MIS 4112), Avenue de l'Europe 20, 13. April 2017 (Beachten Sie die Datumsänderung), 17.15-18.45h

The banopticon approach, as described by Didier Bigo in his article «Globalized (In)security», argues that there is a global tendency to select small groups of people based on their profile, and treat them unfavorably or subject them to heightened surveillance. Profiling is done based on the future potential behavior of the people concerned based on their ethnicity, political history, income, and other variables.

The same tendency can also be perceived in the EU's migration policy. The EU and its Member States tend to select and reject migrants' applications for international protection or residence permits based on profiling – but what are these profiles based on? What is the treatment bestowed on refugees before and after they are profiled? How does profiling relate to international and European human rights standards? These and other related questions will be the subject of the lecture delivered by Prof. Dr. Marie-Laure Basilien-Gainche.

La plupart des juristes des XIXe et XXe siècles ont négligé comme ils le pouvaient cette idée. A la lumière de la situation politique et économique actuelle aux quatre coins de la planète, elle doit aujourd'hui faire l'objet d'un débat entre les juristes continentaux.

4. The Legacy of the International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia and the Nuremberg Principles

International Nuremberg Principles Academy, 5-6 May 2017 (registration required)

The revival of Nuremberg: ICTY - a milestone for the fight against impunity?

The International Nuremberg Principles Academy cordially invites you to the seminar on the 'Legacy of the International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia and the Nuremberg Principles' taking place in Nuremberg on 05.-06.May 2017. The Nuremberg trials, including its subsequent trials ended in 1949 and the International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia (ICTY) was only established in 1993. The seminar will look at the establishment of the first international criminal tribunal since Nuremberg and will discuss the ICTY's legacy in terms of case law development, the prosecution of heads of states, defense strategies and domestic jurisdiction. The Academy will bring together high level academics and legal practitioners from a diverse background and discuss the impact of the ICTY in the region, as well as its impact on the development of international criminal law and the furtherance of the Nuremberg Principles. In 2010, the UN Security Council Resolution 1966 established the International Residual Mechanism for Criminal Tribunals which will continue the jurisdiction, rights and obligations and essential functions of the ICTY once it closes at the end of 2017.

6. Innovative Politik für transformativen Wandel: Vorstellung des UNRISD Flagship-Berichts zur Umsetzung der Agenda 2030

Deutscher Bundestag, 17. Mai 2017, 15.30-17.00h (anmeldepflichtig)

Die DGVN lädt herzlich zur Vorstellung des Flagship-Berichts "Innovative Politik für transformativen Wandel: Umsetzung der Agenda 2030 für Nachhaltige Entwicklung" des Forschungsinstituts der Vereinten Nationen für soziale Entwicklung (UNRISD) im Deutschen Bundestag ein.

Mit der Agenda 2030 für Nachhaltige Entwicklung verpflichteten sich die Mitgliedsstaaten der Vereinten Nationen zur Beseitigung von Armut in allen ihren Formen und zur „Transformation unserer Welt“. Nach dem Beschluss besteht die Herausforderung nun darin, die Vision in die Tat umzusetzen.

Hierzu legt das Forschungsinstitut der Vereinten Nationen für soziale Entwicklung (UNRISD) seinen Bericht „Innovative Politik für transformativen Wandel“ vor, der die Komplexitäten der Agenda 2030 für nachhaltige Entwicklung aufzulösen hilft. Der Bericht stellt nicht nur eine Definition des Begriffs „Transformation“ vor, der als Maßstab für Politikgestaltung verwendet werden kann, sondern greift auch zahlreiche Politikinnovationen aus dem globalen Süden auf und analysiert sie auf ihr Transformationspotential. Darüber hinaus werden neue Forschungsergebnisse aus den Bereichen Sozialpolitik, Sorgepolitik, Sozial- und Solidarökonomie, Klima- und Umweltpolitik sowie Finanzierungspolitik vorgestellt und wird diskutiert, welche Governance-Reformen auf nationaler und internationaler Ebene notwendig sind, um die notwendige öko-soziale Wende voranzutreiben.

7. Principled Resistance against ECtHR Judgments – a New Paradigm

University of Konstanz, 1-2 June (please register)

In recent years, there have been more and more instances where national courts, in a principled manner, declared their unwillingness or inability to give suit to an ECtHR judgment. So far, those cases have initiated discussions about the Court's 'legitimacy' and about the necessity of having a 'dialogue between judges'. The conference takes a different approach, labelling such cases examples of 'principled resistance'. The research question is whether those cases reveal a general pattern: Has the Court overstretched its competence by its evolutive interpretation so that cases of 'principled resistance' may be explained as reactions necessary to preserve national identity? Or is the current accumulation of such cases just a coincidence and are the underlying rationales too divergent to reveal a general pattern? The conference aims to give a dogmatic answer to those questions and thereby to help preserving the long-term functioning of the Convention.

8. 6th ASIANSIL Biennial Conference

Seoul, Korea, 25.-26. August 2017

The 6th Biennial Conference of the Asian Society of International Law will take place in Seoul, Korea, from Friday 25 to Saturday 26 August 2017. The conference will be hosted by the Korean Chapter of the Asian Society of International Law, together with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Korea. The theme of the conference is "Asia and International Law in Times of Uncertainty". The conference will comprise an opening session, two plenary sessions featuring invited speakers, 25 parallel sessions (see the programme of the conference) and a closing session. The biennial conference will be preceded by a half-day workshop for junior scholars on Thursday, 24 August.

II. Call for Papers

1. European Junior Faculty Forum for Public Law and Jurisprudence

WZB Berlin Social Science Center, 28/29 June 2017 (Deadline 15 April 2017)

The WZB Berlin Social Science Center, the European University Institute, and the London School of Economics and Political Science invite submissions for the Inaugural Annual European Junior Faculty Forum for Public Law and Jurisprudence to be held at WZB Berlin Social Science Center on June 28-29, 2017.

Objective

The forum intends to address public law scholarship from a theoretically informed doctrinal, interdisciplinary or comparative perspective, contribute to the research of junior scholars, and create an intellectual community of European public law scholars. Public law focused scholarship from other disciplines (philosophy, political science, history, sociology) is explicitly welcome. The European Junior Faculty Forum for Public Law and Jurisprudence is designed to become a leading forum in Europe for rethinking public law questions and generating innovative ideas.

Format

The forum is modeled on similar forums in North America, such as the Yale-Stanford-Harvard Junior Faculty Forum. It brings together a selected group of early career scholars for what promises to be an intellectually rewarding academic exchange. The papers, selected based upon blind peer-review, will be presented in a workshop at the Center for Global Constitutionalism at WZB Berlin Social Science Center. Two senior scholars will serve as a commentator on each paper, providing criticism and suggesting ways to im-

prove the paper. There is no publication commitment or requirement. Authors of suitable papers may be invited to publish in *Global Constitutionalism* (CUP).

Eligibility

The author must be based in an academic institution in the European Union or in an Associated Country* and have obtained the doctoral degree no longer than seven years prior to the application deadline (excluding periods of maternity/paternity leave and/or career breaks for other caring responsibilities). Postdoctoral students are also eligible to apply. Authors who live or work outside the EU or an Associated Country are eligible to apply provided that they hold a junior faculty position (or the equivalent) in Europe. Co-authored papers are welcome if each author is individually eligible. Papers must be original and should not be accepted for publication prior to the workshop. The paper can focus on any topic relating to public law and jurisprudence, broadly defined, from legal or non-legal perspective (historical, philosophical, political, sociological, etc.).

Procedure

Interested scholars should submit (in English, one single PDF file) a CV (up to 3 pages), an abstract (up to 300 words), and a draft article (8,000 to 15,000 words, including footnotes) to ejff@wzb.eu by April 15, 2017. Decisions will be sent by May 15, 2017. The workshop will be held on June 28-29, 2017 in Berlin at the WZB Berlin Social Science Center. Please remove any reference to the author's identity in the draft articles. Participants selected for the Berlin event will receive an honorarium of 500 Euro. There will be no further reimbursement of travel and hotel costs.

On the occasion of the 13th ESIL Conference in Naples, the ESIL Interest Group on International Human Rights Law invites submissions for a half day workshop on 'Human Rights: Fundamental Values in International Law?'

The 2017 Naples Conference seeks to explore how international law responds to global public goods, global commons and fundamental values. In line with our approach to each annual conference, the ESIL Interest Group on International Human Rights Law will examine the theme of the annual conference from a human rights perspective.

Application Process

We invite submissions of abstracts of no more than 500 words. Selection will be based on how closely tied the abstract is to the theme of the workshop; scholarly merit; and with the view to producing an engaging workshop. All submissions are expected to be submitted as draft papers ahead of the workshop.

Each submission should include the following in the same document:

- (a) short bio containing the author's name, institutional affiliation, contact information and e-mail address;
- (b) an abstract of no more than 500 words.

Applications should be submitted by 20 April 2017 to kuremer@ku.edu.tr. All applicants will be notified of the outcome of the selection process by 20 May 2017. Accepted full papers are due by 20 August 2017.

Die Fragestellung und der Forschungsansatz sollten einen deutlichen UN-Bezug aufweisen und dabei von breiterer Relevanz sein. Über die Vergabe des Preises entscheidet der Forschungsrat der DGVN. Mit dem Preis verbunden ist die Möglichkeit der Veröffentlichung in der Reihe »The United Nations and Global Change« des Nomos-Verlags bei gleichzeitiger Unterstützung für anfallende Druckkosten in Höhe von 1000,- Euro. Andernfalls erhält die Preisträgerin oder der Preisträger ein Preisgeld von 1000,- Euro.

- Die Dissertation soll 2015, 2016 oder 2017 erfolgreich an einer deutschen oder ausländischen Universität abgeschlossen worden sein.
- Sie kann, muss aber noch nicht publiziert sein.

5. Towards Utopia - Rethinking International Law

Walter Schücking Workshop for Young International Lawyers, Kiel, 19-20 August 2017
(Deadline 8 May 2017)

The Walther Schücking Institute for International Law at the University of Kiel is organising a two-day workshop on new and utopian approaches to international law.

Walther Schücking, judge at the Permanent Court of International Justice and namesake of the Institute, was said to hold views “destined to become the law of the future” (James Brown Scott). We wish to discuss visions for that law of the future at the workshop, which will focus on progressive, unconventional thinking and new ways of approaching, using, and conceptualising international (and regional) law. It is aimed primarily at young international lawyers (PhD students or post-docs), in the hope that we may come together as a diverse group of open-minded and idealistic scholars to develop and discuss utopian lines of thought otherwise left unpursued.

We welcome submissions that engage with utopian thought and international law – either in form of substantive suggestions or recursively on utopian approaches in general and the possibility of rethinking international law. Possible topics include but are not limited to:

- The role(s) of utopianism: Which role(s), if any, does utopianism play in current international legal theory and political morality? Which should it play? Are some areas of law (e.g. human rights, *ius cogens*) particularly relevant – or troublesome?
- Moral and legal progress: How, if ever, can we reach or work towards utopia? How should progress be measured? What are the implications for conceptualising time, morality, and law?
- Existing structures: How do current structures of international law (e.g. certain dogmatic approaches, formalism, supposed objectivity or neutrality of law) relate to utopian thought? How, if ever, can these be overcome? Should they?
- Critical approaches revisited: Can primarily critical and deconstructive approaches (feminist, queer, anti-colonialist, critical race or disability studies, etc.) be given positive and utopian formulations?

- Practical implications: What should utopian proposals actually look like? What are their implications for structural reforms of international law and international organisations? What would such reforms entail?

We are honoured that Professor Philip Allott of the University of Cambridge has agreed to join our workshop and discuss these matters. His ground-breaking work on reconceiving international law and overcoming current modes of thought, particularly his recent monograph *Eutopia* (re-published in paperback in March 2017, with a new Introduction), may serve as a starting point for our explorations. It could be commented upon, further developed, or used as a prism through which to analyse certain issues; it can also be criticised or given a feminist or queer reading. All kinds of utopian approaches relating to the topics suggested above are welcome. Professor Allott's work will serve as a common frame of reference that enables discussion among the workshop participants despite a wide range of substantive topics or different approaches.

Professor Allott will also give the inaugural Walther Schücking Lecture on the day before the workshop, which participants are invited to attend. The title of his lecture will be *Beyond War and Diplomacy. A Giant Step for Mankind*.

The workshop will be held on the weekend of 19-20 August 2017, with the Walther Schücking Lecture scheduled for the afternoon of 18 August. We envision a format of intense discussion between around fifteen participants, with each participant giving a brief presentation. Interested scholars should submit an abstract of around 750 words to the organising committee (utopia@wsi.uni-kiel.de) by 8 May 2017. Abstracts must include a title and the name and affiliation of the author; preference will be given to those at an early stage of their career (PhD students or post-docs). We encourage scholars with different backgrounds to apply – interdisciplinary submissions are welcome.

If your abstract is accepted, you will be expected to submit a paper of around 8,000 words (including footnotes) by 7 August 2017. The papers will be circulated among the workshop participants in advance to facilitate an in-depth discussion. Selected papers may, subject to peer review, subsequently be published in the German Yearbook of International Law.

The workshop will take place in a beautiful waterfront location in Kiel, Germany. All reasonable travel expenses for workshop participants will be reimbursed, and hotel rooms in Kiel will be provided for two nights. Further information on funding and reimbursement procedures will follow once participants have been chosen.

Edited by Katja Lindskov Jacobsen (University of Copenhagen) and Kristin Bergtora Sandvik (PRIO/University of Oslo):

Humanitarian actors have always adopted and adapted technology to improve aid delivery and protection practices. What is of particular interest to us – and what we believe merits specific attention – is not only what technology does for humanitarian action, but what it does to humanitarian action.

With this specific focus on 'humanitarian technology' we do not mean to suggest that certain technologies are humanitarian / or inherently benign. As editors, we argue for the need to pay greater attention to the kinds of technologies that various humanitarian actors make use of – including questions about how and why some of these technologies may not necessarily be 'humanitarian', e.g. because of how their application may risk exposing crisis affected individuals and communities to various kinds of insecurity.

Potential topics include but are not limited to:

- The role and place of humanitarian principles with respect to humanitarian technology
- Humanitarian ethics and technology
- How technology changes and challenges humanitarian action
- Humanitarian data and responsible data management
- Humanitarian actors use of 'state security technologies'
- Biometrics in refugee management, food aid and medical humanitarianism
- Cybersecurity challenges in the humanitarian space
- Humanitarian drones
- Humanitarian robotics
- The challenges of adopting and adapting specific technologies for the humanitarian sector (3D printers, IoT)
- The relationship between humanitarian technology uses and refugee identity, safety and security
- The relationship between humanitarian technology uses and donor demands

Zum Leibniz-Projekt „Strukturwandel des öffentlichen Rechts“

Das von der DFG finanzierte Leibniz-Projekt „Strukturwandel des öffentlichen Rechts“ entwickelt den konzeptionellen und methodischen Ansatz einer interdisziplinär, international und intradisziplinär orientierten, aber gleichwohl dogmatisch geerdeten Wissenschaft vom öffentlichen Recht fort. Ziel ist die konzeptionelle Aufarbeitung und Durchdringung des Strukturwandels des öffentlichen Rechts vor dem Hintergrund der am Institut schon bestehenden Projekte, die jeweils bereits Teilelemente dieser neuen Entwicklung reflektieren. Ausgangspunkt ist ein Verständnis des öffentlichen Rechts als ein Recht der politischen Herrschaft im nationalen, supranationalen und globalen Kontext. Die Ausübung politischer Herrschaft kann heute nicht mehr allein aus der Perspektive nationaler Rechtsordnung verstanden und konzeptualisiert werden; vielmehr teilen staatliche Institutionen das Strukturmerkmal der Ausübung öffentlicher Gewalt heute mit vielen supranationalen und internationalen Institutionen. Diese Phänomene sind in der doppelten Perspektive von Effektivität und Legitimität aufzuarbeiten. Neben dem Verständnis der Interdependenzen und Interaktionen zwischen verschiedenen Rechtsordnungen und Akteuren ist daher auch die Neuvermessung von Grundbegriffen der Rechtfertigung öffentlicher Gewalt notwendig.

Diese Entwicklung erfordert eine methodische und konzeptionelle Neuausrichtung der Wissenschaft vom öffentlichen Recht, wie sie etwa die Gründung der Internationalen Vereinigung für öffentliches Recht (International Society of Public Law) im Juni 2014 in Florenz reflektiert.

Die Neuausrichtung sollte drei Elemente beinhalten: eine methodische Europäisierung und Internationalisierung der Wissenschaft vom öffentlichen Recht, eine horizontale Öffnung des öffentlichen Rechts in vergleichender Perspektive sowohl gegenüber dem Recht anderer Staaten als auch gegenüber anderen Sub-Disziplinen (u.a. dem Privatrecht) und die Transformation der disziplinären Identität, um interdisziplinär und theoretisch informierte Forschung zum Strukturwandel des öffentlichen Rechts zu gewährleisten. Der methodische Schwerpunkt der Aufarbeitung europäisierter und internationalisierter öffentlicher Gewalt liegt dabei weiterhin auf der dogmatischen Rekonstruktion als spezifisch juristische Methode im öffentlichen Recht, um die Phänomene europäisierter und internationaler politischer Herrschaft durch dogmatische Begriffe und Prinzipien zugänglich zu machen. Ganz im Sinne der Empfehlungen des Wissenschaftsrates bedarf dieser für die deutsche öffentliche Rechtswissenschaft charakteristische Zugang aber angesichts der skizzierten Entwicklungen einer interdisziplinären, intradisziplinären und internationalen Einbettung.

3. Between Codification and Progressive Development: International Criminal Law after Rome and Kampala

19th Summer Session of Salzburg Law School on International Criminal Law,
Humanitarian Law and Human Rights Law, 30 July - 9 August 2017, Salzburg (Deadline:

The upcoming session will focus on substantive international criminal law. SLS will discuss developments within the ASP Working Group on Amendments on the further harmonization of international criminal law applicable in armed conflicts of international and non-international character, adding the use and the threat to use nuclear weapons in the definition of war crimes, and including the crime of terrorism and the crime of international drug trafficking in article 5 of the Rome Statute.

4. Summer Law Program on International Criminal Law and International Legal & Comparative Approaches to Counter-Terrorism

International Criminal Law: in Search for Accountability

The first part of the summer program will focus on International Criminal Law. What are international crimes, and how have the definitions of these crimes evolved in the last decades? The role of the International Criminal Court, ad-hoc tribunals and hybrid courts will be analysed, as well as their political and judicial shortcomings. This part of the summer program will also examine the interplay and interdependence between the different international criminal tribunals and national courts that cater to international criminal justice. It will look at the role of states, not only in preventing serious violations, but also in bringing those responsible to justice. Finally, the concepts of amnesties and immunities will be explained and how these could possibly affect prosecution of international crimes.

International Legal & Comparative Approaches to Counter-Terrorism

The second part of the summer program will focus on International Legal & Comparative Approaches to Counter-Terrorism. Terrorism and the measures that are being adopted to counter terrorism are prominent on the agendas of international organisations, governments and think tanks around the world. The program will look into the definitions of terrorism and counter-terrorism, and the evolution of these concepts since 9/11. The program will also look at how human rights are raised in the context of terrorism, especially in light of the attacks throughout 2016, and the counter-measures that are being adopted. Moreover, the summer program will critically look at how the armed conflict approach deals with terrorism. It will elaborate on how the criminal justice sector tackles terrorism from an international, regional and domestic perspective. The need for cooperation with respect to prevention and suppression of terrorism will also be examined. The summer program will conclude with the phenomenon of foreign terrorist fighters, a growing concern in many countries.

13. International Humanitarian Law: Current Developments and Challenges
